Having a plan is the first step in safeguarding properties and livelihoods against the impacts of natural disasters and keeping our community safe. By following these five simple steps, based on the Get Ready model, you can increase your safety before a disaster strikes and potentially save lives.



1. Know your risk

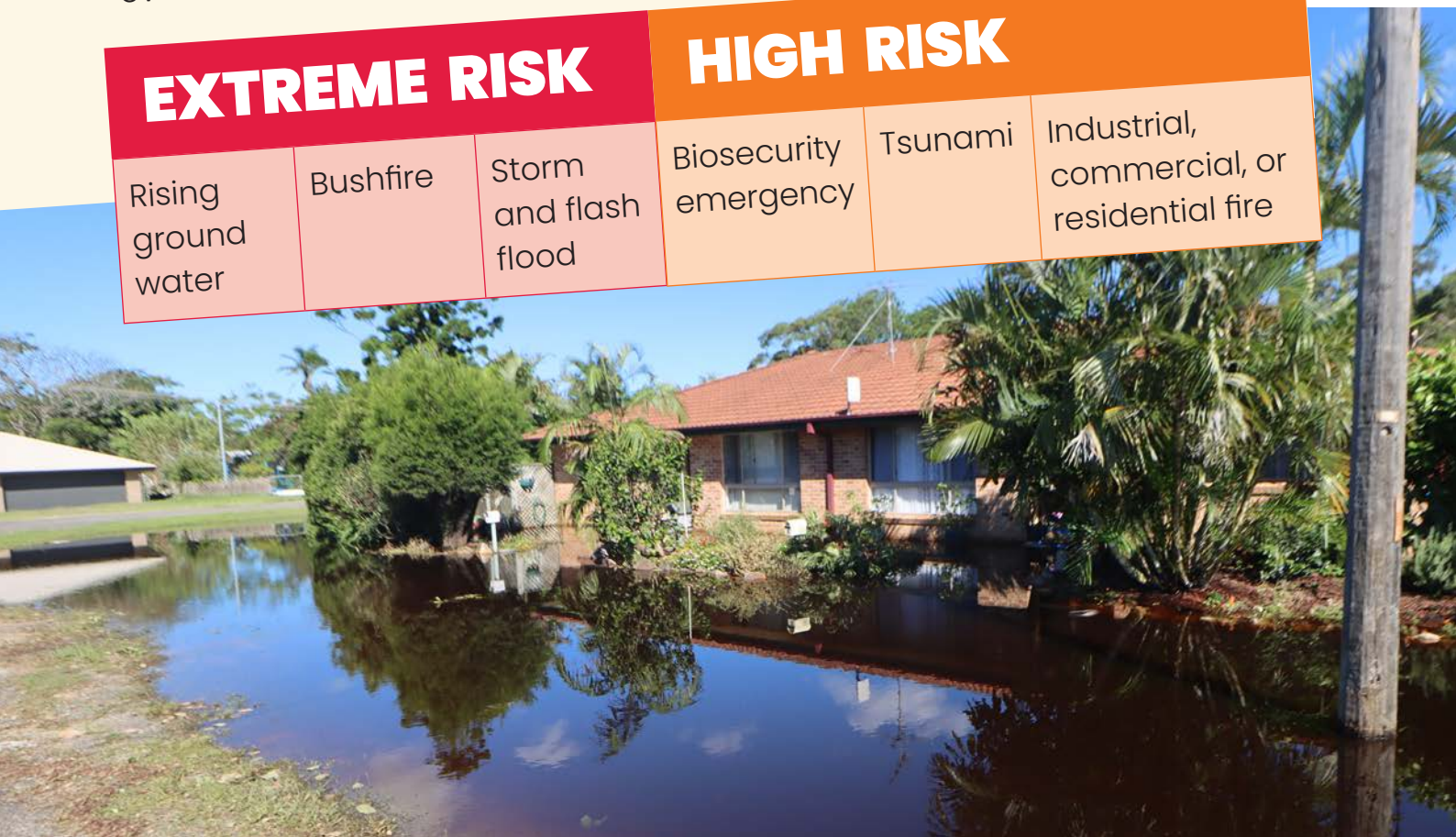

2. Plan for what you will do

Disaster can strike at any time - you need to be prepared

Sit down and talk with your family and friends and plan for what you will do if a disaster affects your area. Having a plan will help you respond to disaster quicker, more calmly, and will help each member of your household know what to do.

Your plan should include the people who live in your home, pets and livestock, personal belongings, and details of where you might go if you need to evacuate.

3. Get yourself and your home ready

Pack an essential emergency kit for home

Being prepared and having an emergency kit ready is important in case you need to remain at home for a few days without access to shops.

Your essential emergency kit should be stored in a sturdy waterproof container somewhere safe yet easily accessible.

Make sure everyone in your family knows where it is stored.



4. Be Aware Stay informed as situations can change quickly

In a disaster, staying informed could save your life.

- **The ABC** is the official Emergency Broadcaster: ABC Mid North Coast: 684 KHZ AM
- **Council's website** and social media pages will feature emergency information
- **Emergency Service** apps have up-to-date information, and some will push emergency notifications to you.

5. Look out for each other

Family, friends and neighbours

Talk about your emergency plan with your family, friends, neighbours and colleagues. Discussing your plan is a great way to raise awareness of the importance of being prepared while helping to cement your plan in your mind.

People often get separated in an emergency. By having a plan and

telling people where you will go if a disaster strikes it helps to keep you safe and minimises added stress.

In an emergency, acting on incorrect information can be deadly. Only share trusted information, not rumours.

Use the emergency broadcaster, Council's updates and emergency service apps.

YOU'RE NOT ALONE

To support everyone living, working or visiting our shire, there are plans in place to prepare for, respond to and recover from natural disaster.

WHO IS RESPONSIBLE?

Emergency Management arrangements in NSW are enabled under the State Emergency and Rescue Act 1989. This determines which Emergency Service is responsible for leading the response to specific disasters.

Storms, flood and tsunami	State Emergency Service (SES)
Bushfire	Rural Fire Service (RFS)
Fire, rescue and hazmat	Fire and Rescue
Water-based incidents	Marine Rescue
Water safety and rescue	Surf Life Saving Australia
Livestock Welfare	Department of Primary Industries

Triple zero (000) is the number to call for ambulance, police or fire services in an emergency. Only call triple zero (000) if the situation is serious and urgent.
